The Deep End I'll do it tomorrow!

Those of us who are procrastinators will identify with today's Gospel. We have the best of intentions, but somehow our 'to do' list for today keeps getting pushed out until tomorrow, and the next day, and the next week. There is always an excuse, or something more urgent that needs to be done. The things that we do not prioritise get relegated to the bottom of the list, and sometimes drop off altogether, so that they never get done. In Luke's Gospel, when Jesus invites people to follow him, he gets some similar responses – I'll be right with you, I'll add it to my 'to do' list. 'I will follow you, sir, but first let me...' The excuses these people give are far from feeble: one wants to go and bury his or her father first, another simply wants to say goodbye to their family. But Jesus has what sound like very harsh words for these predicaments. There is no time, there can be no excuses, this is more important. Discipleship is a path that requires sacrifice. It is a path that means living in a new and different way. Rather than focusing on the past, we need to move forward and get on with the task. Jesus tells us: 'Once the hand is laid on the plough, no one who looks back is fit for the kingdom of God.' There is work to be done, and it cannot wait. People who are hungry, homeless, marginalised or suffering cannot wait. The earth cannot wait. Our 'to do' lists need to be shaken up. If we are to live as disciples, the time is not tomorrow, it is now.

This Week: Since the Feast of the Holy Trinity we have been listening at communion time to the beautiful hymn "Panis Angelicus" as a preparation for the feast of Corpus Christi. The version sung by the Priests



(not Frs Peter, Dermot and Padraig) gave a beautiful atmosphere to the solemnity as it highlighted the mystery of the Eucharist "Oh such a wonderful thing .. that the lowly, the ordinary and the poor could receive the Lord" (O res mirabilis, manducat Dominum, pauper, servus et humilis)

If you thought that things in the Parish were slowing down after the first communions ... you will be slightly shocked to know that so much is going on. Let's give you a few highlights.

The First Communion children had a special participation in the Mass on Sunday as they returned in their first communion outfits and answered difficult questions. They also received the sheep that they adopted at the beginning of their first communion journey. The DTIM team has done a wonderful job.





St Olaf's school celebrated the 50th anniversary of its foundation with a beautiful Mass full of symbols and enhanced by the readings, the hymns and prayers of students, former students, staff members, board of management and parents. There was a great buzz in the parish Centre after the Mass as people chatted and shared a cup of tea or crisps.

A special team met to analyse the future of youth ministry in the parish. Different ages and visions were represented at the conversation. It is part of an ongoing effort of the Youth Ministry Team to challenge the parish into making it a place for younger members of the community.

The organizers of the 'Lazy Christians Pilgrimage' booked the plane tickets for the group going leisurely to London in September. The Pilgrims had their first information meeting on Thursday.

The graduation prayer service was held in Queen of Angles school on Tuesday morning as the 6th class students said goodbye to their teachers. A similar event took place for the 6th class of St Olaf's on Wednesday

HOW CAN I HELP MY PARISH?

the Nine Things you can do:

- 1. <u>Active participation in the liturgies</u>: Going to Mass, praying with the community, singing at the top of your voice and not dozing during Fr Peter's monologues.. (this last one is optional)
- 2. <u>Being a Welcomer</u>: Our parish is a family of families, it is a community of communities. We have to try and get to know each other. All of us can be "Welcomers" be willing to say hello to a new face, make an effort to go to the coffee dock to meet other members of the community, be particularly gentle with the very young, the elderly or those who have a different accent or those who come visiting. A smile, a hand shake, a few friendly words have no cost and cannot be taxed. Being a Welcomer is good for your health.
- 3. Engaging in some form of formation (forgive the pun): The mindfulness, the Scripture courses, theology courses, liturgy courses ... we should all be updating our Christian knowledge and our skills in the fields of prayer and liturgy. A community that continually educates itself in the faith will be able to provide answers that society needs of them.
- 4. Offering input on one of the committees or Boards: The Parish needs guidance and governance and that is provided in many forms: The Parish Pastoral Council, the Finance Committee, the Board of Management of the Centre, the Liturgy Committee, the BOM of the two schools are just some of the ways that Parish is steered though the vicissitudes of day to day life.
- 5. <u>Avidly reading the bulletin or going on the website</u>. The bulletin is produced each week and contains information about the Parish, future events and diocesan life.
- 6. Contributing to the parish through the Family offering and the 400 club. How do we finance the operation of the Parish? The biggest contributors are the Family Offering (envelope, Standing order) and the 400 Club. These enable the parish to pay salaries, to upgrade installations and to keep ourselves warm.
- 7. <u>Making suggestions:</u> Since the suggestion boxes were installed we have had some very helpful insights and suggestions. You might spot a detail that no one else has seen, or you might have an initiative, or there might be an issue that needs to be aired. All suggestions are brought to the Parish Council meetings for further action.
- 8. Becoming a volunteer: the last count was 34 ministries/groups in the Parish. The very backbone and life of Balally is and has been the ownership and involvement of the volunteers. There must be one for you.... or two.
- 9. <u>Health, Safety and Cleanliness</u> are the responsibility of all of us. Picking up that paper, opening that door, putting things back in their place, being careful while parking... are just a few examples of how we can help in Health/Safety/ Cleanliness.

On Wednesday evening a group of people gathered in the parish to consider the theme of youth ministry in the community.
